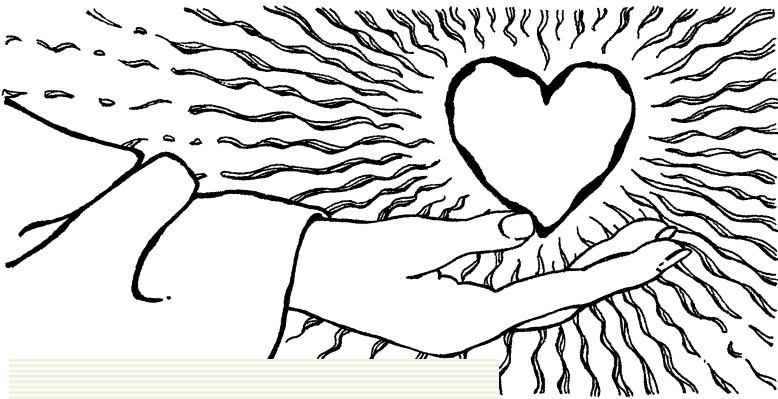


Third Sunday of Lent

THE MYSTERIOUS ONE

Last Sunday we gathered with Peter, John, and James at the mountain of Transfiguration and were summoned to listen to God's chosen Son. This week the scriptures draw us into the mystery of just who that God is. The first reading, perhaps one of the best known in the Bible, recounts the story of Moses and the burning bush, when the mysterious divine name is revealed. The responsorial psalm is a hymn extolling the attributes of God. Saint Paul and the Lord Jesus describe a God who judges and metes out punishment. No matter the lengths to which the scriptures go, we know that no amount of words will ever come close to capturing who God is. Our lives and our Lenten journeys toward that mysterious One who will one day welcome us into the heavenly home that awaits those who put their trust in God alone.

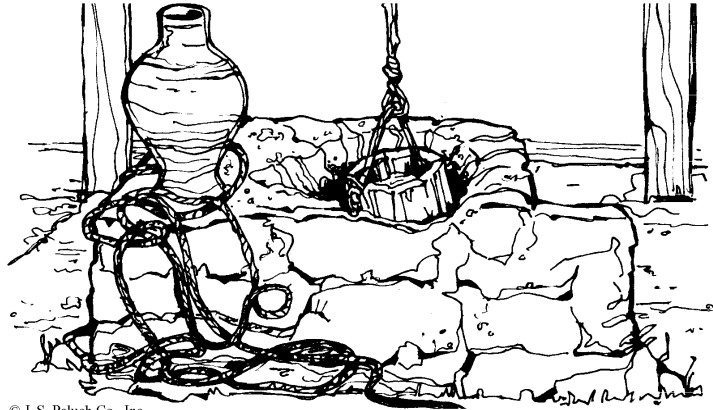

FRUITFUL OR PRODUCTIVE?

“Yes,” said Joel, “I’m hooked on productivity. I run a business, and my wife and I have three young children. I have to produce and my employees have to produce if we’re to accomplish anything. My days are jam-packed. If there’s any time left over I spend it with my family.” Joel’s thinking on productivity received a shake-up at a men’s retreat. The retreat leader asked a question. “When you think of Jesus, do you think of him with a daily to-do list? (‘Three people healed today. Two fast comebacks to the scribes and Pharisees. One really great parable told. Oh yes, and dinner for 5,000. And I got the disciples to distribute the leftovers. A very good day. Well done, me’).” Joel listened intently. “Jesus spoke wisely and constantly extended mercy and grace. He might now and then retreat from the crowds, yet when he was with people, he was really with them. He saw needs that others could not see. He loved people well. But was he productive? Productivity can become a mind-set of constantly moving forward. Being busy, not at times and in moderation, but as a lifestyle.



Productivity seeks what fruitfulness claims as its starting point—the assurance of God’s presence and love.” Fruitfulness, Joel saw, allows you to be fully present in the moment. Fruitfulness is deeply rooted in the soil of God’s grace. Fruitfulness requires a fundamental trust in the Holy Spirit, like compost around the roots of the fig tree in today’s Gospel. The Spirit is working at all times and in all places and, if we allow it, is at work in us—busy or not.

SAINT FRANCES OF ROME (1384-1440)

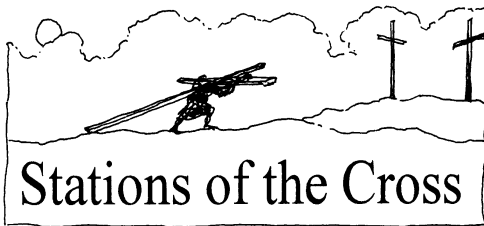

Nature and human nature—plagues and wars—turned late medieval Rome into a living hell, particularly for the sick and poor. Frances, by birth and marriage well provided for, was a devoted wife and mother; but like Benedictine Oblates who, to this day, “pray and work” while living with their families and working in the world, she joined like-minded laywomen friends in ministering to society’s most vulnerable. Frances’ charity was not only “hands on” but “in home.” Her palace becoming a hospital after the plague claimed two of her three children. When her husband’s death ended their loving marriage of forty years, Frances joined other widowed Oblates in community. In an interesting link to the United States, our nation’s premier religious congregation for women of color, the Oblate Sisters of Providence, in 1833 established bonds of spiritual communion with these “Oblates of Saint Frances” in Rome. Attention All First Confession/First Communion Candidates – all those wanting to make their First Confession and receive their First Holy Communion must be attending Mass on Sundays. This is a requirement of the Universal Church and is reinforced by the teaching of Bishop Steib. Therefore, all those who are candidates for First Confession and/or First Holy Communion must sign in on the sheet in the vestibule each week. If they attend another church on occasion they must bring a bulletin from that church with the pastor’s signature and give it to their religion teacher/catechist. This requirement begins today. No letters will be written by Fr. Timby approving the celebration of the sacraments until the pastoral team reviews the weekly attendance sheets for Mass and participation in religion classes.

Stations of the Cross – The Stations of the Cross will be celebrated twice each week during Lent. They will be celebrated on Wednesday afternoons in a simple format for the children of the school, but Adults are welcome. On Friday evenings, the Stations will be celebrated at 6:30 p.m. with Benediction following. There is a plenary indulgence attached to the proper meditation of the Stations of the Cross on Fridays during Lent. This means that if you make a good confession within seven days before or after meditating on the Station all temporal punishment in Purgatory for sins committed will be forgiven.

The meal is also a community event, meaning that all members of the celebrating community provide the ingredients for the meal whether they plan to participate or not. Therefore we ask that ALL families provide the following items in the coming weeks so the Knights of Columbus can prepare a proper marinara sauce and have enough spaghetti for everyone:

LAST WEEKEND – ONE 32-ounce cans of crushed tomatoes

TODAY – ONE pound of thin spaghetti

NEXT WEEKEND – TWO large cans of spinach

If you forgot an item one week or attended the 10:30 Mass last Sunday when Fr. Timby forgot to announce the need for the crushed tomatoes, you can bring you items any weekend through Sunday, March 14. Those going on the Holy Land Pilgrimage may want to drop their donations off at the rectory sometime this week.

Remember, the meal is free to all who come. There will be a basket on the St. Joseph Altar for donations to the poor in zip code 38127 to be administered by the St. Vincent De Paul Society. And, everyone will received a goodie bag of Italian cookies, a pray card, a St. Joseph medal and a fava bean.

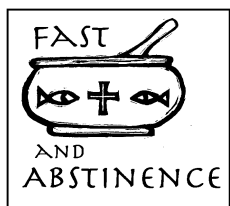
On the altar will be statues of different saints, who join Joseph in interceding for us who remain to face trial and tribulation. Also, parishioners are invited to being framed pictures of the deceased loved ones to be placed on the altar among the cakes, breads, fruit and vegetables that remind us of God's generosity and mercy.

We are still looking for volunteers to make:

- ~ a white lamb cake (Wanda Rivera will make)
- ~ a Bible cake(Mary Sawicki will make)
- ~ a Chalice cake (Linda O'Donnell will make)
- ~ a cake with the image of St. Joseph (Mary Sawicki will make)

No **baptisms** will be celebrated during Lent to focus our attention on the call to conversion and the significant role the sacrament plays in the celebration of the Easter Vigil. In fact, there will be no holy water available during the season. So, if you need a supply for your home, be sure to get it before Feb.16th.

Ash Wednesday and all Fridays of Lent, including Good Friday, are also days of **abstinence** from meat and meat by-products. *All Catholics who have celebrated their 14th birthday are obliged to abstain from meat and all food made with or flavored with meat on these days.*



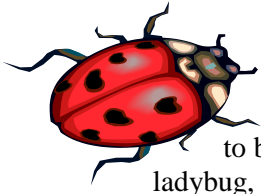

For those who wish to beg the question “What is meat?” the answer is: “meat” is the slaughtered of flesh of any creature that uses lungs to breathe, e.g., cows, chickens, whales, frogs, snake, etc. Fish and other creatures that do not use lungs to breathe are not considered “meat” and may be consumed in days of abstinence. There is no dispensation from abstinence, not even for health reason or “old age,” despite the valiant efforts of some to get me to give one!

An Explanation – A commonly asked question is what do we consider to be “meat” when determining how to abstain from meat on the Fridays of the year, especially during Lent when it is absolutely required? The answer is quite simple: If it has lungs, it is considered to be meat. This applies only to the butchered flesh of an animal and not eggs, milk or cheese. Fish have gills, not lungs, so fish is allowed for consumption. And, as I told one little boy when pressed for a more definitive answer: Yes, all insects may be eaten on the Fridays of Lent but one might want to be sure they don't overeat them on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday lest they not be fasting as prescribed for all Catholics of age.

Poor Man's Supper – Each Friday night during Lent we will have our traditional “Poor Man's Supper” in the cafeteria following the Stations of the Cross. The supper will be prepared by a differ parish organization each week. The one exception this year will be Friday, March 19, the Solemnity of St. Joseph, when we will have an Italian Feast to honor the spouse of Mary and the earthly father of Our Lord Jesus (additional information is in the bulletin).

Ladybugs – One of parishioners who seemed to know the ins and out of ladybugs told Fr. Timby last weekend that the invasion of these diminutive insects came from the poinsettias we had in church for Christmas. After doing some research on the internet, the claim was proven to be true. It seems that the poinsettia is a natural host to the bugs, which are actually cousins to the ladybug, because they eat the aphids that occupy the undersides of the leaves of the plant in warmer climates. Additionally, plants that are sold through florists and other retail outlets are treated with a bath that kills the eggs before they are shipped but plants sold to “open air” nurseries and nature centers at stores like Lowe’s and Home Depot are not treated, allowing the eggs to mature in the warmth of their new home. It takes 4-6 months for an infestation to disappear. Welcome to the of the church lady bugs!

Fr. Timby’s Throat – Fr. Timby has been burning up I-40 between Memphis and Nashville the last several Mondays having additional tests done on his throat. He will have surgery again sometime after Easter to deal with scar tissue that resulted from the radiation and has caused Father to develop esophageal immobility that makes it difficult for him to swallow solid food. The doctor who will do the surgery said he will use the same anesthesia that result in Michael Jackson’s death but there will be two differences: he will have an anesthesiologist present and working and he isn’t going to make a house call. It’s great to have doctors with a sense of humor!
