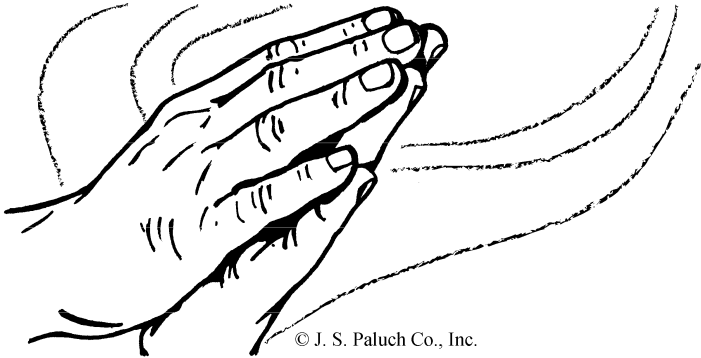


Thirtieth Sunday in Ordinary Time

FOR THOSE WHO PERSEVERE

There is a slight but real shift in scriptural focus for the last few weeks of the liturgical year. For many weeks we have been hearing what it means to be a faithful disciple. Now we will focus on the reward that awaits those who persevere on the long journey of faith. This Sunday we hear that impartial justice will be done in the courts of our eternal judge.

First, Sirach teaches us that the “God of justice . . . hears the cry of the oppressed” and “the one who serves God willingly” (Sirach 35:12, 13, 16). Then we hear Paul echo what the psalmist proclaims, “When the just cry out, the Lord hears them . . . and those who are crushed in spirit he saves” (Psalm 34:18, 19). Finally, the parable of the Pharisee and the tax collector who went to the temple to pray affirms that God will exalt all who cry out for mercy.

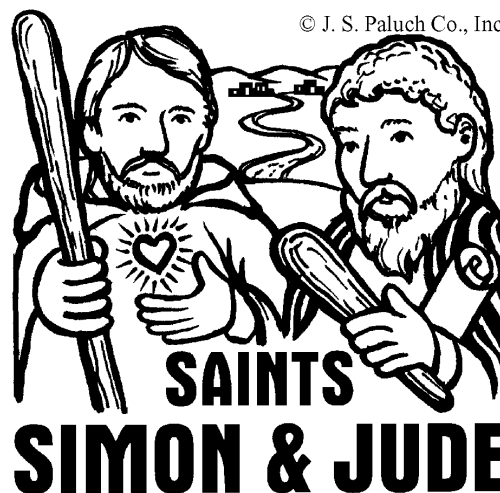

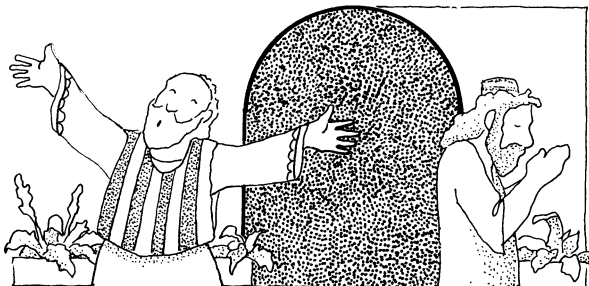

All Souls Day – It is a Catholic tradition to remember the Faithful Departed in a special way on November 2nd each year. Known as the Feast of All Souls we offer Masses for the “Poor Souls” in Purgatory, especially our own loved ones who have preceded us in death. The Church teaches and believes that all souls, no matter how holy they appear to human eyes, must be purified before entering the heavenly kingdom. We read in the Catechism of the Catholic Church:

(1031)The Church gives the name Purgatory to this final purification of the elect, which is entirely different from the punishment of the damned. The Church formulated her doctrine of faith on Purgatory especially at the Councils of Florence and Trent. The tradition of the Church, by reference to certain texts of Scripture, speaks of a cleansing fire:

As for certain lesser faults, we must believe that, before the Final Judgment, there is a purifying fire. He who is truth says that whoever utters blasphemy against the Holy Spirit will be pardoned neither in this age nor in the age to come. From this sentence we understand that certain offenses can be forgiven in this age, but certain others in the age to come.

(1032) This teaching is also based on the practice of prayer for the dead, already mentioned in Sacred Scripture: "Therefore [Judas Maccabeus] made atonement for the dead, that they might be delivered from their sin." From the beginning the Church has honored the memory of the dead and offered prayers in suffrage for them, above all the Eucharistic sacrifice, so that, thus purified, they may attain the beatific vision of God. The Church also commends almsgiving, indulgences, and works of penance undertaken on behalf of the dead:

Let us help and commemorate them. If Job's sons were purified by their father's sacrifice, why would we doubt that our offerings for the dead bring them some consolation? Let us not hesitate to help those who have died and to offer our prayers for them.

Please **print** the names of those you wish to have remembered in the Mass of that day and included in our Book of the Faithful Departed that will be on display the entire month of November until the first Mass of Advent so that they can be recorded correctly. If you would like to read more about Judas Maccabeus you can find his story in the two books of Maccabees in the Bible, which tell the story of people who are faithful to God’s commandments even in the face of personal persecution.

BENEATH THE SURFACE

“Jesus addressed this parable to those who were convinced of their own righteousness and despised everyone else,” says Luke’s Gospel today (Luke 18:9), and what follows is the familiar story of the Pharisee and the tax collector, praying near each other in the temple. The Pharisee apparently follows all the religious rules, including fasting and tithing, but his heart is not in the right place. He not only thanks God for making him better than other people, but he lists those he feels are his inferiors, including the man standing nearby. Why, in the New Testament, are tax collectors regarded with such aversion? Very simply, they colluded with the hated Roman conquerors in collecting the empire’s taxes, and they usually exacted far more than they were entitled to, becoming rich in the



process. The Pharisee apparently feels entitled to lump the tax collector together with a list of evildoers. It is a blanket condemnation. But outward appearances can be tricky, for they do not reveal what is in the heart. In Jesus’ story, the tax collector—part of a despised and corrupt profession—makes no statement of self-justification and no comparisons between himself and other people. Instead, with an awareness of his own sins and failings, he simply bows his head and begs for God’s mercy. Not in prayer, but in ordinary conversation and in silent thought, how often do we compare ourselves to other people? If we *always* claim superiority over others on the one extreme, or *always* claim that we ourselves are worthless on the other, we are totally distorting the truth. It is a natural to say, “Where do I fit in?” when interacting with other people, but to frame it in terms of superiority or inferiority is not Jesus’ way, nor should it be ours.

- Participate in the weekly celebration of Sunday Mass;
- Receive a Mass attendance ticket from Fr. Timby following each Sunday liturgy and give it to their religion teacher for safe-keeping.

Those just beginning their sacramental preparation process must complete the following if they wish to receive First Holy Communion or Confirmation in Spring 2012:

- Be enrolled in and an active participant in religious education for at least two full consecutive years at the time of the sacramental celebration;
- Participate in the weekly celebration of Sunday Mass, even during summer months;
- Receive a Mass attendance ticket from Fr. Timby following each Sunday liturgy and give it to their religion teacher for safe-keeping.



Our Lady of Divine Providence

Devotion to Our Lady of Divine Providence originated in Italy in the thirteenth century, and was carried to Puerto Rico in the 1850s by Bishop Gil Esteve Tomás. The original statue at the cathedral there was eventually replaced by a wooden carving in 1920 that has become the most familiar image of the patroness of Puerto Rico.

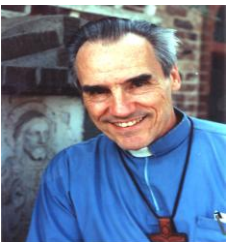

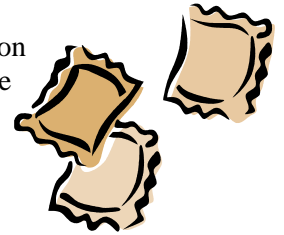
