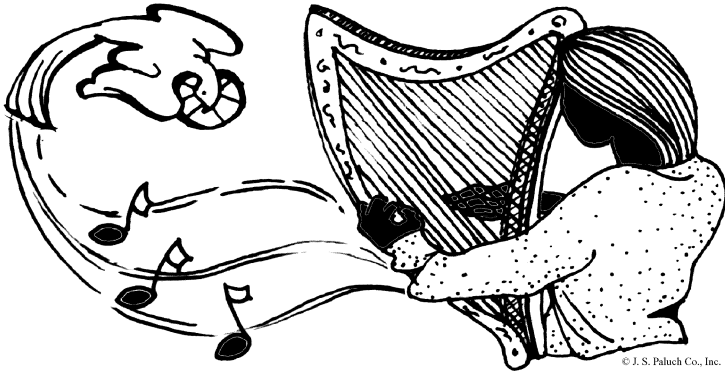

PERSEVERE IN OUR DAILY WORK

In our world and culture, where hard work is valued so much (we even give over a whole day on the civic calendar to celebrate labor) and our “busyness” seems to escalate continually, Paul’s admonitions to the Thessalonians seem a bit obvious. But even in our lives today, when we have more and more devices to save time, and still seem to have less and less of it, people yet find ways to be busybodies in the midst of all their busy-ness. In Paul’s day, some members of the Christian community were being idle because they knew the Lord was returning in glory very soon. Why bother to work? So they turned their attention to meddling in the lives of others. Theirs was a rather complacent “I’ve been saved” attitude in the face of the great tumult of the end times described by Malachi and Jesus in the Gospel. These days, we have no such potent notion of the Lord’s imminent return, but Paul’s message, which has an echo both in Malachi and Luke, is still pertinent for us. We must keep on doing our daily work, and persevere in it, consecrate it all to the Lord, and tend to being faithful until the time of his return.

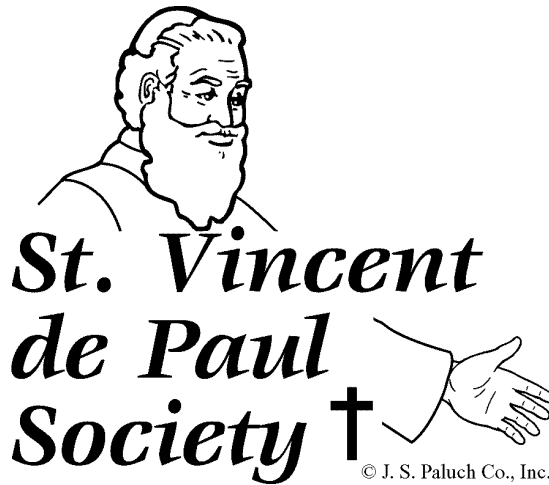

Did You Miss the Sacrament of Confirmation along the Way?: Through no fault of their own, many young Catholics miss the sacrament of Confirmation in their youth. Did your parents move while you were a teenager? Did you miss participation in a religious education program? If you missed receiving the sacrament of Confirmation (or, Eucharist) in your youth, please let us know. We are eager to assist you in becoming fully initiated into the life of the Church. DON'T THROW GOOD MONEY AWAY!!!! Please clip and save the Box Tops for Education labels from General Mills products and put them in the box in the vestibule of the church. Every label is worth 10¢ to our school. As you prepare to bake for the holidays, please consider purchasing Betty Crocker mixes that have TWO labels per box and doubling your contribution to the school. This is a great way to support the school without having to write a separate check. We've already collected almost 1,000 labels this year and our goal is 10,000.

It's Tamale time!: The Hispanic community is taking orders now for chicken and pork tamales. The tamales are \$1.00 each and are so much better than what you get in grocery stores and restaurants. Orders to be pick up, will be available after all Masses this weekend of Nov 13 & 14.

Thanksgiving Day Blessing of Food – Families are invited to bring one dish that will be on their Thanksgiving table and place it on the altar rail at the 9:00 a.m. Mass on Thanksgiving Day to be blessed with the bread that will be distributed to each family at that Mass. Remember, Thanksgiving is a celebration of God's generosity to us and bringing food to be blessed is a sign of our recognition that we depend on God for everything.

Thanksgiving Day Mass – We will celebrate Mass on Thanksgiving Day (Thursday, Nov. 25) at 9:00 a.m. Once again, we will have a Procession of Offerings with each person coming forward and placing non-perishable canned goods in baskets to be distributed to the poor and their monetary gifts to the parish in the Offering Basket held by the altar servers. Thanksgiving is America’s unique “holy day” as it is a day dedicated to giving thanks (Eucharist) to God for the bounty we have received, and there is no better way to celebrate God’s blessings to our nation than through the perfect sacrifice of the Mass. If you are traveling at Thanksgiving you can still get to Mass; your hosts will understand, especially if you invite them to go with you. Don’t let your houseguests be an excuse for not getting to Mass on Thanksgiving; invite them to give thanks with you at church. (You could even give them a can of beans or a box of macaroni to bring forward in the procession.)

THE LITTLE WAY

In a life of only twenty-four years, cut short by tuberculosis, Saint Thérèse of the Child Jesus and the Holy Face—often known as The Little Flower—showed us a life of dedicated discipleship that any of us can imitate. From the age of 15 she lived in the obscurity of a convent in Lisieux, in northern France,



communicating the unfolding of her spiritual life in a series of short books and letters. Her writing is in the style of her times, and some have dismissed it as cloying and sentimental. Yet she blazed with such love that she has influenced thousands in the century since her death. Thérèse focused on what she called “the little way,” a manner of serving God by a persistent endeavor in the details of everyday life. This included the difficult task of accepting all work that came her way and attempting to love the community of her sisters in religious life. That was no easier for her as a cloistered nun than it is for us in our families, communities, and workplaces. She experienced times where she could not pray and suffered greatly as her illness progressed. Yet she persevered in this “little way” to such an extent that, in an unusually short time after her death, she was canonized and then declared a doctor of the Church, the

youngest of only thirty-three saints ever given that title and only one of three women—the others are Saint Teresa of Ávila and Saint Catherine of Siena. Most importantly, especially in the light of today’s scripture readings, Saint Thérèse always had a firm hope of heaven and saw it as a seamless transition from the pilgrimage of faith here on earth. She even said, “I will spend my heaven doing good on earth.”

SAINT ROSE PHILIPPINE DUCHESNE

(1769-1852)

November 18

Pope Benedict once declared himself struck by how remarkably diverse our American saints are—some native born: Mother Seton, Katherine Drexel, Kateri Tekakwitha; most, like many Catholics today, immigrants: Padre Serra, Bishop Neumann, Mother Cabrini, Rose Philippine Duchesne. When the French Revolution that dispersed her convent ended, Rose joined the Religious of the Sacred Heart, volunteering for their United States mission, opening the first free school west of the Mississippi. Only after lengthy service as Superior did Rose—now seventy-one—realize her life's dream, undertaking a mission among the Potawatomi Indians. When some worried about her advanced age and failing health, the Jesuit mission leader overruled them: "She must come! She may not be able to do much work, but she'll bring the mission success by praying for us!" Frustrated by her inability to learn their languages, Rose nevertheless "spoke" to the Native Americans by her prayerful presence before the tabernacle. "Quah-kah-ka-num-ad," they named her, "Woman-Who-Prays-Always"—their way of bestowing the title the Church would later make official: saint!

Those just beginning their sacramental preparation process must complete the following if they wish to receive First Holy Communion or Confirmation in Spring 2012:

- Be enrolled in and an active participant in religious education for at least two full consecutive years at the time of the sacramental celebration;
- Participate in the weekly celebration of Sunday Mass, even during summer months;
- Receive a Mass attendance ticket from Fr. Timby following each Sunday liturgy and give it to their religion teacher for safe-keeping.
