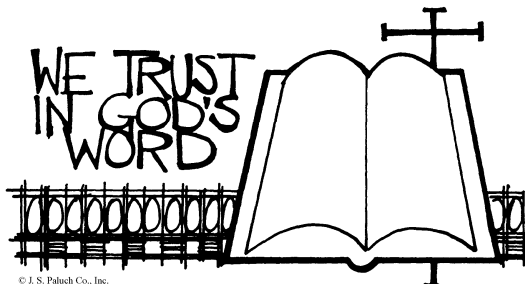

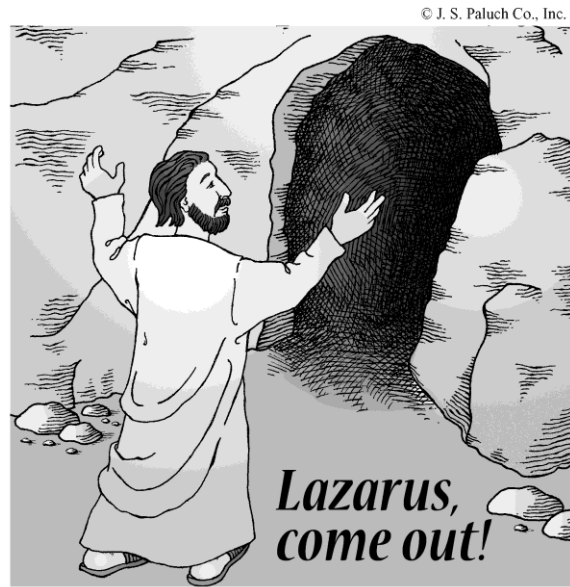

**FEAST OF FAITH**  
**The Gospel Reading**

The climax of the Liturgy of the Word comes with the proclamation of the Gospel. Everything tells us that something important is happening. We stand. We sing special acclamations. Servers with candles and sometimes incense lead the deacon or priest to the ambo, where the reading is proclaimed from a special book.

All of the readings are important, but the liturgy directs special attention to the Gospel for a reason. “[A]mong all the inspired writings, even among those of the New Testament, the Gospels have a special place, and rightly so, because they are our principal source for the life and teaching of the Incarnate Word, our Saviour” (*Dei Verbum*, the Dogmatic Constitution on Divine Revelation of the Second Vatican Council, 18). In the Gospels, the narrative of Christ’s saving life, death, and resurrection continues to be proclaimed in our midst.

Our Sunday Lectionary is structured so as to allow us to hear as much of the Gospels as possible. The readings are arranged in a three-year cycle. In Year A, the Gospel readings are taken mainly from Matthew; in Year B, from Mark and John; and in Year C, from Luke. In this way, over the course of three years, we hear a substantial portion of all four Gospels. —*Corinna Laughlin, © Copyright, J. S. Paluch Co.*

## NOT THE END

We struggle these days in talking about death. Until the last century most people rarely, if ever, talked openly about sexuality, but all were familiar with death because family members died at home: a mother in childbirth, small children from infectious diseases, and grandparents from the ills of old age. Nowadays the reverse is true. Discussion about sex and sexuality is a commonplace in our world and death has become the great taboo. Death in this country is



mainly compartmentalized in hospitals, hospices, and nursing homes, where the dying are surrounded by high-tech equipment and professional personnel who do the best they can to ease the pain and suffering. We ourselves may be so troubled or even afraid to think about death that we do not use the words “died” or “dead” in ordinary conversation. Most people prefer to substitute another word or phrase: “Grandpa passed away.” “We lost Uncle David.” “Jean has gone to be with the Lord.” Today’s readings are all about death but, even more powerfully, about the ability of our Lord and God to raise us up from death. There is the death of the spirit in this life, when a person turns away from God or simply becomes apathetic or goes through the motions of belief, and there is the final death of the earthly body that must come inevitably to each of us. If we do not tackle the “little death” of apathy and failure to live as a disciple of Jesus, we are unlikely to face the end of our

mortal life with either hope or peace in our hearts. The Good News of Jesus is that we can rise from the little deaths of sinfulness and indifference—beginning right now—and because he died and rose again we can hope for eternal life with him. *Copyright © 2010, World Library Publications. 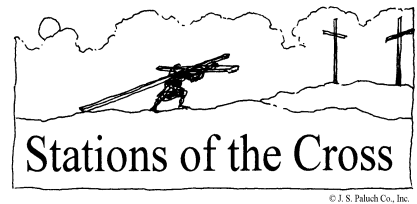

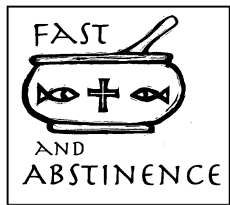

**Stations of the Cross** – The Stations of the Cross will be celebrated twice each week during Lent. They will be celebrated on Wednesday afternoons in a simple format for the children of the school, but Adults are welcome. On Friday evenings, the Stations will be celebrated at 6:20 p.m. with Benediction following. There is a plenary indulgence attached to the proper meditation of the Stations of the Cross on Fridays during Lent. This means that if you make a good confession within seven days before or after meditating on the Station all temporal punishment in Purgatory for sins committed will be forgiven.



**Ash Wednesday and all Fridays of Lent**, including Good Friday, are also days of **abstinence** from meat and meat by-products. *All Catholics who have celebrated their 14<sup>th</sup> birthday are obliged to abstain from meat and all food made with or flavored with meat on these days.* For those who wish to beg the question “What is meat?” the answer is: “meat” is the slaughtered of flesh of any creature that uses lungs to breathe, e.g., cows, chickens, whales, frogs, snake, etc. Fish and other creatures that do not use lungs to breathe are not considered “meat” and may be consumed in days of abstinence. There is no dispensation from abstinence, not even for health reason or “old age,” despite the valiant efforts of some to get me to give one!



**An Explanation** – A commonly asked question is what do we consider to be “meat” when determining how to abstain from meat on the Fridays of the year, especially during Lent when it is absolutely required? The answer is quite simple: If it has lungs, it is considered to be meat. This applies only to the butchered flesh of an animal and not eggs, milk or cheese. Fish have gills, not lungs, so fish is allowed for consumption. And, as I told one little boy when pressed for a more definitive answer: Yes, all insects may be eaten on the Fridays of Lent but one might want to be sure they don’t overeat them on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday lest they not be fasting as prescribed for all Catholics of age.

No **baptisms** will be celebrated during Lent to focus our attention on the call to conversion and the significant role the sacrament plays in the celebration of the Easter Vigil. In fact, there will be no holy water available during the season. So, if you need a supply for your home, be sure to get it before Mar 8<sup>th</sup>.

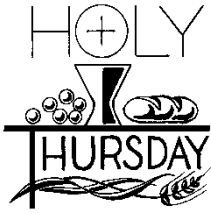
**Poor Man’s Supper** – Each Friday night during Lent we will have our traditional “Poor Man’s Supper” in the cafeteria following the Stations of the Cross. The supper will be prepared by a different parish organization each week.



**Seder Meal** – Everyone is invited to join us for our Seder Meal on Monday, April 18<sup>th</sup>, in the gymnasium at 6:30 p.m. This is a celebration of the meal that Jesus last shared with his disciples before his arrest and passion. This year we have new participants’ books and have added traditional Jewish music to the celebration. It is a pot-luck dinner, so bring enough for your family PLUS four other people. If your family would like to lead the service before the meal please contact the Parish Office. Two parents and one young child (6-9) is the minimum required to lead the service.

**Procession with Palms** – Next Sunday is Palm Sunday. We will have our traditional processions with palms at the 10:30 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. liturgies. The processions will begin in front of the rectory (weather permitting). We will begin promptly at 10:30 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. so please be on time. In the event of bad weather, there will be no procession.

**Chrism Mass** – On Tuesday, April 19<sup>th</sup>, Bishop Steib will celebrate the annual Chrism Mass at which the sacred oils to be used at the Easter Vigil and through the next year will be blessed and consecrated. Also, our pastor and all the priests of the diocese will renew their vows at this liturgy. All those being baptized and/or confirmed this year are expected to attend. The Mass will be at the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception and begins at 7:00 p.m.



**Mass of the Lord's Supper** – On Holy Thursday, the Mass of the Lord's Supper will be celebrated at 7:00 p.m. The liturgy will be bi-lingual and includes the Presentation of the Sacred Oils, the Washing of the Feet, and the Transfer of the Blessed Sacrament to the Altar of Repose. All those being baptized, making a profession of faith, being confirmed or making their First Communion this spring are required to be present and participate in the Eucharistic Procession. Everyone is asked to remain in church and keep silence as the altar is stripped.

**Holy Thursday Foot-washing:** The traditional foot-washing will take place during the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday. We are in need of a maximum of 12 individuals to volunteer to have their foot washed. Please sign-up on the sheets in the sanctuary. We will only use the first 12 people to sign up.

**Eucharistic Adoration** – in the tradition of the Apostles who were instructed by Jesus to “keep watch and pray,” we are asked to keep vigil through the night on Holy Thursday. Solemn adoration of the Blessed Sacrament held in the Tabernacle on the Altar of Repose begins at the conclusion of the Mass of the Lord's Supper and continues until midnight. After midnight, adoration continues in a less formal way as people come and spend time before the Altar of Repose through the night until dawn. Rotating hours, we are asked to keep vigil according to the following schedule:

09:00pm -- 10:00pm	Family Names beginning with H - Q
10:00pm – 11:00 pm	Family Names beginning with R - Z
11:00pm – 12:00am	Family Names beginning with A – G

**Veneration of the Cross and Holy Communion** – On Good Friday, the Veneration of the Cross will be celebrated at 7:00 p.m. and will include the reading of Passion according to John and Holy Communion. The liturgy will be bi-lingual. We remember to maintain silence throughout the day unless it is absolutely necessary to speak.

**Good Friday Stations of the Cross** – The Stations of the Cross will be celebrated at 2 p.m. Weather-permitting, the Stations will be done outside in the Fr. Gantert Memorial Garden.

**Altar Servers** – Please remember that **YOU** are responsible for finding a substitute if you are not going to be present for your assigned Mass on the weekend and holy days. The parish counts on your being present to assist at the altar and disregard for the schedule disrupts the worship of the entire community. Please pay attention to the schedule that is mailed to you because we are counting on you to be present.

**Bishop's Annual Appeal** – Our Lady of Sorrows has a goal of \$26,000 for this year's Bishop's Annual Appeal. Our parish receives many benefits from this annual fund drive, e.g., the Tribunal, liturgic, all training seminars, youth gatherings, days of reflection, catechist certification, retreats and continuing education opportunities for our priests and deacons, and much support from the Catholic Schools Office. When you receive Bishop's Steib's letter asking for your help, please respond generously in thanksgiving for what we have received.

**Diaconate Ordination:** Patrick Hirtz will be ordained to the Order of Deacon at the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception on Sunday, June 5, at 10:00 a.m. Patrick was assigned at OLS as a seminarian and invites the parishioners to help him celebrate. A reception will follow the Mass of Ordination.

**Teens4Christ:** The OLS Youth Group will not meet this week. Next week, which is Holy Week, all members of the Youth Group are asked to help set-up for and clean-up after the Seder Meal on Monday evening. They should be at the gym no later than 5:30 p.m. This activity counts toward service hours.
